➤ A valid employee photo ID the U.S. government, Georgia, or any county, municipality, board, authority, or other entity of Georgia			
➤ A valid U.S. military photo ID			
➤ A valid tribal photo ID			
➤ A student ID from Georgia's public colleges and universities and technical colleges			
→ A current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck, or other government document that shows your name and address

STEP 6: When you get your ballot, complete your absentee ballot as soon as possible.		As soon as possible.
Sign the oath and enter your Georgia driver's license, state ID, or last four digits of your social security number on the back of the return envelope.		
STEP 7: Return your absentee ballot by mail or by drop box.	By mail: two stamps. By drop box: at least one in every county.	As soon as possible. DEADLINE: received by county by 7pm on election day.
STEP 8: Check to make sure your ballot was accepted.	Go here. Enter your name, county, and birthdate information. Click the link for Absentee Ballot/Early Voting Status	Check every day after you go vote until you see your ballot was accepted.

Know Before You Go (Absentee Ballot Voting)

IF YOU REQUIRE ASSISTANCE TO VOTE BY ABSENTEE BALLOT:

- ➤ If you are a voter with a disability, you may ask for assistance from the person of your choice to complete an absentee ballot application.
 - The person providing assistance must sign the oath on the absentee ballot application.
- ➤ If you are a voter with a disability, you may ask for assistance from the person of your choice to complete your absentee ballot.
 - The person providing assistance must sign the oath on the absentee ballot.
- If you are a voter with a disability, you may have an authorized person return your ballot for you.
 - An authorized person who may return your absentee ballot for you may be:
 - A caregiver, even if the caregiver does not live with you.
 - A close relative, such as your mother, father, grandparent, aunt, uncle, brother, sister, spouse, son, daughter, niece, nephew, grandchild, son-in-law, daughter-in-law, father-in-law, brother-in-law, or sister-in-law.
 - Another individual who lives with you.
